## Numeral

A numeral (numerals) is a number, letter, word (and sometimes their combination), representing a certain number. English numerals are divided into two large groups: cardinals and ordinals. In this article, we'll talk about quantitative.

Cardinals stand for a specific number, quantity, or amount. They can be expressed both in numbers (1, 10, 100) and in words (one, ten, hundred). They answer the question "How much?" (How much / many?).

Please note that before the words hundred, thousand, million, if they are not part of a composite numeral, there is an indefinite article - 'a' or the numeral one: a hundred / one hundred, a thousand / thousand, a million / one million. But the use of the article 'a' is preferable. Cardinal numbers from 1 to 100

Cardinal numbers in English have a stable (constant) form and do not bend in any way.

To form numbers from 13 to 19, take numbers from 3 to 9 as a basis and add the suffix -teen:

\* three + teen = thirteen (13)

\* four + teen = fourteen (14)

\* five + teen = fifteen (15)

\* six + teen = sixteen (16)

\* seven + teen = seventeen (17)

\* eight + teen = eighteen (18)

\* nine + teen = nineteen (19)

There is a rule for the formation of tens: we also take the numbers from 2 to 9 as a basis and add the suffix -ty:

Numbers up to 100 in English can be plural: ones, twos, threes... nines. But, basically, this applies to dozens when it comes to years. To convert them to plural, you need to adhere to the following principle: 'y' change to 'i' and add 'es'.
